





MEMORIES OF A DARWINIAN: ANARCHISM AND ANIMALITY IN THE WRITINGS OF RAFAEL BARRETT, 1904-1910



Building on insights from critics Francisco Corral, Leandro Delgado, and Ana María Vara, my reading of the Hispano-Paraguayan anarchist teases out Barrett's idiosyncratic Darwinism from his exposé of labor abuses in the yerba mate industry (Lo que son los yerbales, 1906) and the literary-scientific crónicas he published in the newspapers of Asunción, Montevideo, and Buenos Aires in the early years of the twentieth century. I suggest that Barrett's highly aestheticized political and scientific discourse may be productively interpreted in dialogue with modern and contemporary biophilosophy from writers including Henri Bergson, Elizabeth Grosz, Donna Haraway, and Gilles Deleuze. In Barrett's vibrant and eclectic writings, the understanding that human and non-human animals are separated by degrees of difference rather than stark ontological divides prompts intermittent passages in which a spontaneous intuition of amorphous connection to other life-forms arises, a phenomenon Grosz calls "becoming undone." These moments enable Barrett to engage in a trans-specific affective community across vast extensions of time and space, a move that echoes his critique of capitalist exploitation across human and nonhuman life-forms.


## 2024 Lavender Languages Institute


